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The Rock Opera TOMMY, which was first performed by The Who in 1969, was originally conceived by Pete Townshend and Kit Lambert with contributions to the development by John Entwistle, Keith Moon and Roger Daltrey.

The Who's Tommy contains war themes, death, drug use, bullying and occasional coarse language. Tommy also contains a scene where it suggests that his uncle molests him. We believe the adult content has been dealt with sensitively and appropriately, however we apologise if this content distresses some audience.

Tommy is a full scale musical with loud sound, bright lights including strobe lighting, and pyrotechnics

Message from the Director

The song "Amazing Journey" begins Tommy's narrative for the events in his life that are laid out for us in the story to follow. My own amazing journey with the music of *Tommy* started a few decades ago with the double album by The Who released in 1969 and the first record I owned. This started a passion for The Who's music that continues to this day. The band are still playing live and touring the UK at the time of this production. I saw The Who play live in Sydney in 2004 and again in Brisbane in 2009 with Bruce Menzies our MD. The energy and delivery was amazing with the Tommy numbers a standout. It was at that time that Bruce and I started talking about staging the musical, so here we are seven years later.

Tommy is not often performed and it was apparent to me that the story had to be more cohesive and the characters have more depth. The story is almost entirely sung so in essence a "rock opera" as The Who first described it in 1969. In the 60's the band's music was about alienated youth struggling in a world that didn't understand them. Then as now, the struggles through childhood into adolescence and adulthood remain much the same and sometimes the only way to survive what life throws at you is to shut down the senses. Being deaf, dumb and blind may have been brought on by Tommy witnessing an act of violence, but in a larger sense this mirrors how society sometimes deals with unspeakable horrors we can inflict on each other. There is adult content that might distress some audience, but ultimately this show is about the music, the joy of being and of awakening. For those who know The Who's music, the rediscovery of its power and passion will once again excite your senses. For those hearing it for the first time, I guarantee you will not forget it!

Thank you to everyone involved with this production; particularly Bruce for his inspired musical direction, Deborah for the amazing and many many costumes, Tracey for brilliant choreography, Pat for engineering my set design to life, Pam who hunts to the end of the earth for props, Robyn for her masterful "but not my genre" piano, and Neil for his steady hand on production. As Tommy sings..."I'll be your leader, I'll be your guide, on the Amazing Journey, together we'll ride!

Warren Bartik - Director

Warren has been involved with theatre and film in Armidale over the last 20 years with credits in writing, production, direction and performance. Recent key performance roles have included Titanic the Musical, Blood Brothers the Play, Urinetown, and The Hatpin. Warren has directed a number of shows of different genres from St Marys Revues, Community Pantomimes, and Favourite Shorts. He is also a production member of Opera New England. Tracey has been performing on stage for almost fifty years and has worked in the entertainment industry in a variety of capacities from singing and performing, playing the piano and as a choreographer. She has choreographed many productions for the Armidale and Drama Musical Society and the former Armidale Playhouse including *Cabaret*, *Joseph and the Amazing Technicolour Dreamcoat*, A *Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum, Titanic, Music Man, Orpheus in the Underworld* and *Jesus Christ Superstar*. Tracey has played a number of roles with the ADMS and the Armidale Playhouse including the Baker's Wife in *Into the Woods*, Mrs Lovett in *Sweeney Todd*, Buttercup in *HMS Pinafore*, Alice Beane in *Titanic*, the Narrator in *Joseph*, The Crofter's Wife in *The 39 Steps*, and Truvy in *Steel Magnolias*. She rarely performs in her real hair and has a large collection of wigs.




Robyn Bradley - Assistant Musical Director/Repetiteur

Mrs. Walker Carol Elder

Carol has been treading the boards for a number of years now and thoroughly enjoys every show. Previously she has been involved in the The Armidale Playhouse production of *Into the Woods* as the evil stepmother, and ADMS productions of *Oliver, Fiddler on the Roof, Pirates of Penzance, Joseph and His Technicolour Dreamcoat, Titanic, Urinetown, The Hatpin, Jesus Christ Superstar, Legally Blonde* and the drama, *Steel Magnolias* as M'Lynn. Carol is also vocalist in a number of local bands including The BopCatz and The Al Heeney Rhythm & Blues Experience.



Captain Walker Neil Horton

Captain Walker is Neil's first major lead role since Officer Lockstock in Urinetown in 2010. But he hasn't been far away, lurking around in recent shows with minor roles such as Annas in Jesus Christ Superstar and Elle's father in Legally Blonde. Neil's history with ADMS goes back almost 20 years. Neil has directed and/or performed in far too many shows to mention them all. Lead roles in Les Misérables, Titanic and South Pacific and directorial ones for Les Misérables, Guys and Dolls, Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat, and last year's The 39 Steps are but a few. Neil is also a life member and the current President of the ADMS.



Uncle Ernie Stuart Pavel

Since first taking to the boards as a rat in kindergarten, Stuart has been actively involved in theatre and musical theatre ever since. Serious roles started in Year 10 with *The Beggar's Opera* and continued through his time at Sydney Conservatorium and roles with the Young Opera Company. For many years Stuart was heavily involved with the Blue Mountains Musical Society as performer and musical director. While living on the Blue Mountains he was a member of the Sydney Philharmonia Choir and performed at the Sydney Olympics opening ceremony and the backing choir for the Barbra Streisand millennium tour. Since moving to Armidale, Stuart has been Director of Music at PLC and has performed in a number of shows and concerts for ADMS and the Armidale Symphony Orchestra.



Cousin Kevin Matthew Whittingham

Although this is his first major role with ADMS, Matthew is no stranger to the boards. He has previously performed with the Ballina Players as Enjolras in *Les Misérables*, Molokov in *Chess*, and Melvin P Thorpe in *The Best Little Whorehouse in Texas*; with the Young Opera Workshop Lismore as Jupiter in *Orpheus in the Underworld*, Koko in *The Mikado*, and The Pirate King in *The Pirates of Penzance*; with the Earle Page College Musical Society as Benjamin Coffin III in *Rent*, the voice of the Plant in *Little Shop of Horrors*, and Judge Turpin in *Sweeney Todd*; and with the Port Macquarie Players as the Cowardly Lion in *The Wizard of Oz*.



The Acid Queen Tracey Hughes-Butters

Tracey is extremely proud to be joining the ADMS cast of *Tommy*. As a child, Tracey was introduced to the joys of musical theatre as she watched her father direct musicals for the Grenfell Dramatic and Musical society. She first appeared on stage while fronting bands in her teenage years. In the early 80s, Tracey joined the Vandenberg Players in Forbes, working with Peter Cox and Bruce Mumford and later, the Spectrum Theatre company in Merimbula. From the obnoxious sword-flashing Lelio in *The Venetian Twins* to the highly strung Rita LaPorta in *Lucky Stiff*, Tracey is pleased to say that she has never been type-cast!
